
- You have career interests in medical sciences, public health, sustainability or science technology


* This LC is a good fit for you if:

LEARNING COMMUNITY MEDALLION

Students who successfully complete Saint Louis University's Learning Community requirements receive an academic certificate of completion and graduation medallion to be worn at commencement. An award ceremony is held each spring for all Learning Community Scholars.

DOCTRINA PROGRAM

The Doctrina program is designed to help you get involved with faculty events, social activities with your peers provided by the LC program and events across campus. Upon completion of the Doctrina program requirements, you will earn an academic certificate of completion and a graduation medallion to be worn at commencement.

To complete the Doctrina Program, you must earn 40 points each semester by attending and reflecting on community experiences and events sponsored by the Learning Community Program.

HOW TO JOIN A LEARNING COMMUNITY

1. Select your Learning Community.

Select the community or communities for which you want to apply. Don't forget to look at the requirements for each Learning Community because some require a specific major.

2. Submit both your Housing and Learning Community contracts.

Apply for your Learning Community by submitting the Learning Community contract in addition to the Housing contract, which is available through **auth.slu.edu**. You must submit your enrollment deposit before you can access your contracts. In order to be included in the first round of Learning Community assignments, you must complete the Learning Community contract by **May 1**. Acceptance to Learning Communities is on a rolling basis until filled.

3. Confirm your Learning Community courses.

Before SLU 101 orientation, you will be registered for your Learning Community's associated courses. At SLU 101, you will meet with an advisor to make sure the courses fit your major and schedule.
