It will be attended by hundreds of scholars from across the nation and around the world. This year we will also welcome several new sponsors, including De Re Militari and the Ibero-Medieval Association of America. As always, registration for Saint Louis University faculty and students is free. We will send instructions for complimentary registration soon via email.

Graduate students will have an opportunity to volunteer to support the conference during registration. As in past years, student supporters will receive a special pub night and a great chance to meet the many distinguished scholars attending. Volunteers are also eligible to apply for travel and research funding from the new **SMRS Graduate Student Fund**.

As always, the Annual Symposium will offer a variety of other activities and events. These include guided tours of Historic Downtown St Louis as well as the Cathedral Basilica of St. Louis. Publishers from across the country will attend and present their latest titles. The Symposium Plenary Speakers for 2018 are **Carole Hillenbrand** (University of St Andrews) and **Geoffrey Parker** (The Ohio State University).


Have a Nominee for the 2018 Annual Lecture?
