Field Placement Guide for Students

This guide provides information related to local field placements at SLU Law (more information available here: https://www.slu.edu/law/experiential-learning/clinic-field-placement-information.php). This guide covers the following local placements:

- Corporate Placements
- Criminal Defense Placements
- Criminal Prosecution Placements
- Health Law Placements
- Judicial Placements
- Public Interest Placements

Some placements may have special limitations related to concurrent legal employment (e.g., at a law firm), and some concurrent legal employment is prohibited entirely (e.g., federal judicial placements). Placement sites may also require extensive background checks, conflicts checks, drug screenings, and other paperwork. Students should consult with individual faculty advisors about these requirements.

Students with transportation and scheduling limitations (e.g., no access to a car, work obligations, family obligations) that could impact their participation in a field placement should consult with individual faculty advisors about their specific circumstances.

This guide does not cover the Employment Law Semester in D.C. or Health Law Semester in D.C. programs.

Corporate Placements

Students may be placed in a variety of nonprofit and for-profit corporate counsel and government settings where they assist with a variety of transactional or litigation matters.

Placements noted with a plus sign (+) may satisfy a Concentration in International and Comparative Law requirement, subject to approval.

Placements noted with a carrot (^) may satisfy a Concentration in Intellectual Property Law requirement, subject to approval.

<u>Criminal Prosecution Placements</u>

Students interested in criminal prosecution may be placed in a federal or state prosecutor's office in Missouri or Illinois where they assist in criminal prosecution matters.

Students may have opportunities to present preliminary hearings, handle bond review motions, second-seat jury trials, and participate in plea and sentencing hearings. Students also engage in legal research and writing, as well as listen to jail calls or other evidence review. Students may also spend time in the warrant office where they can observe witness interviews and how the prosecutor makes charging decisions. These field placements may require students to pass a background check, have a Rule 13 student practice license, and pass a drug test.

These crimes may include, for example, terrorism, drug trafficking, financial fraud, public corruption, firearms, child exploitation, bank robberies, interstate kidnapping, tax fraud, counterfeiting, human trafficking, immigration crimes, and civil rights violations.
	Students have opportunities to work in civil and criminal divisions. Students may be involved with witness interviews, agent meetings, grand jury preparation, research and writing, depositions, document and evidence review, and court appearances. Court appearances may include witness examination or trying petty offenses. Students may also have opportunities to be involved with appellate cases, including assisting with writing appellate briefs.
	This field placement requires students to pass a background check and an extensive security clearance. This placement requires at least 4 credit hours of field work. In addition, students may not have concurrent employment.

Health Law Placements

Students pursuing a concentration in Health Law may be placed with a health system, corporate counsel office, or U.S. Attorney's Office to work on health law-related matters.

Placements noted with an asterisk (*) may satisfy a Concentration in Health Law requirement, subject to approval.

This placement requires students to pass a background check and an extensive security clearance. This
	placement requires 6 or 8 credit hours of field work. In addition, students may not have concurrent employment. Health Care Law is a prerequisite. The SDIL opportunity is in Fairview Heights, Illinois.

Judicial Placements

Students are placed with judges to serve as part-time law clerks. Depending on the chambers, students may assist in preparing bench briefs and opinions; observe oral arguments, trials, or hearings; and perform legal research and write legal memoranda.

In both the fall and spring semesters, students may be placed in a federal district court (i.e., district and magistrate judges in the U.S. District Court for the Eastern District of Missouri or U.S. District Court for the Southern District of Illinois), a state or local trial court in Missouri, or a state or local trial court in Illinois. In addition, students with some bankruptcy knowledge may be placed in a federal bankruptcy court. In the spring semester, students have an additional opportunity for placement with a judge on the Missouri Court of Appeals or the Eighth Circuit Court of Appeals.
