3. How did you analyze the assessment data? What was the process? Who was involved? **NOTE:** If you used rubrics as part of your analysis, please include them in an appendix.

Each semester instructors provide the BSSW Program Director with the number of students enrolled in their course, number completing course-embedded Learning Outcome measure, and scores for each student. The Program Director calculates the percentage of students achieving 100% for each course-embedded measure. This information is then provided to the School's Program evaluator for analysis.

The learning outcomes in both learning agreements are measured by field instructors using a 5-point scale with anchors ranging from (1) Performance is generally unacceptable, (2) Student inconsistently meets competency, (3) Student meets competency most of the time, (4) Student consistently meets competency, and (5), Student consistently exhibits mastery of competency. (See Tables 1 and 2). Senior Exit Survey and field evaluation measures are gathered by the School's Program evaluator who de-identifies the data and enters it into a spreadsheet and/or tables. This data is then analyzed in the aggregate and results are entered into a report. Quantitative data is analyzed using descriptive statistics and frequency counts. Qualitative data are analyzed using content analysis methods. All data is reported to the program in the aggregate.

The 2017 Assessment of the Saint Louis University BSSW Program revealed that students did not achieve 100% on the three learning outcomes (LO4: 81%, LO5: 97% and LO9: 70.5%) (Table 3).

5. How did your analysis inform meaningful change? How did you use the analyzed data to make or implement recommendations for change in pedagogy, curriculum design, or your assessment plan?
