In 2013, the College for Public Health & Social Justice (CPHSJ) was established, unifying the School of Public Health, the School of Social Work, and the Criminology & Criminal Justice program. The social work program was established in 1930 and was first accredited in 1933. It became an autonomous School of Social Service in 1964. The School of Public Health was established in 1991 and undergraduate degree programs in public health and health management date back to 2007.

The College is committed to a strong Jesuit tradition of caring and advocating for the underserved and marginalized. Each major requires a minimum of 120 credit hours for graduation. Service learning, practicum, immersion trips, and the opportunity to study on the SLU Madrid Campus are additional features of the undergraduate program.

The BA in Criminology and Criminal Justice requires a minimum of 120 credits for graduation. The program offers coursework that provides students with a foundation for understanding the causes and correlates of crime and the systems that respond to criminal behavior. The program's unique focus on human justice is intended to support students learning regarding the humanity of all who are involved in the justice system—victims, offenders, and practitioners. Through rigorous academic coursework, students become educated consumers of research that can be applied to justice settings. Community-based experiential learning opportunities train students to be effective and transformative practitioners and citizens. Through an integration of scholarship and community-engaged service, students become aware of issues related to human and social justice in an increasingly diverse and globalized world. The program offers a Bachelor of Arts (BA) and a minor in Criminology and Criminal Justice.

The B.S. in Emergency Management requires a **minimum of 120 credits** for graduation and involves the study of all aspects of emergencies and disasters including prevention, preparedness, response and recovery. The curriculum draws upon the expertise of faculty from four CPHSJ Departments: Biostatistics; Environmental & Occupational Health; Epidemiology; and Health Management & Policy. Adjunct faculty who are professionals in the field of emergency management also teach for the program.

GPA Requirements

- 1) Cumulative GPA of at least 2.5.
- 2) Minimum grade of “C” in all required 100- to 400-level Emergency Management Major Courses.
- 3) Minimum grade of “C-” in all Core Courses and General Electives counting toward the minimum 120 credits required for graduation.

The curriculum is designed to accommodate the needs of pre-professional students (i.e., pre-med) and the preference of some students to pursue second majors, and/or a minor(s). The undergraduate curriculum requires a **minimum of 120 credits** for graduation and draws upon expertise of faculty within the Department of Health Management & Policy, as well as adjunct faculty who are professionals in the health management field to create a unique program that prepares students for the business elements of health care delivery.

The B.S. in Health Management provides an overview of the basic concepts of management within a health care setting. The College also offers an accelerated B.S./M.H.A., a competitive application program, which allows students the opportunity to earn a B.S. in Health Management in four years and a Master of Health Administration (M.H.A.) with one additional year of study.

GPA Requirements

- 1) Cumulative GPA of at least 2.5.
- 2) Minimum grade of “C” in all required 100- to 400-level Health Management Major Courses.
- 3) Minimum grade of “C-” in all Core Courses and General Electives counting toward the minimum 120 credits required for graduation.
- 4) Students who wish to apply for the accelerated B.S./M.H.A. program will be expected to meet certain additional requirements as outlined in the *CPHSJ Undergraduate Public Health Student Handbook*.

Public Health (BS)

B.S. in Public Health

The B.S. in Public Health requires a **minimum of 120 credits** hours for graduation and draws upon expertise of faculty within five departments within the College: Biostatistics; Behavioral Science & Health Education; Environmental & Occupational Health; Epidemiology; and Health Management & Policy. The degree provides an overview of basic public health concepts and prepares students for careers in disease prevention and health promotion at the population level. Service learning is at the heart of the curriculum and allows students to apply classroom concepts while serving in the community. The curriculum is designed to accommodate the needs of pre-professional students (i.e., pre-med) and the preference of some students to pursue second majors, and/or a minor(s). The College also offers a minor in Public Health and an accelerated B.S./M.P.H., a competitive application program which allows students the opportunity to earn a B.S. in Public Health in four years and a Master of Public Health (M.P.H.) with one additional year of study.

GPA Requirements

- 1) Cumulative GPA of at least 2.5.
- 2) Minimum grade of “C” in all required 100- to 400-level Public Health Major Courses and Major Electives.
- 3) Minimum grade of “C-” in all Core Courses and General Electives counting toward the minimum 120 credits required for graduation.
- 4) Students who wish to apply for the accelerated B.S./M.P.H. program must meet additional requirements as outlined in the *CPHSJ Undergraduate Public Health Student Handbook*.

Accelerated Public Health/ Master in Public Health (BS/MPH)

The accelerated B.S./M.P.H. is designed for students who demonstrate academic success in Public Health and related coursework and allows students to use up to 30 graduate credits towards their undergraduate degree. Students apply to the accelerated program during the fall semester of their fifth semester of studies. Application procedures and program details

are outlined in the *CPHSJ Undergraduate Public Health Student Handbook*. Students who transfer to the University after their sophomore year will be ineligible for the accelerated option.

Minor in Public Health

A minor in Public Health provides students with an introduction to public health and its role in disease prevention and health promotion, both at the global and local levels. A total of 18 credit hours are required for the completion of the Public Health Minor.

The School of Social Work's Bachelor of Science in Social Work (BSSW) Program prepares undergraduate students for beginning professional social work practice. The BSSW degree provides generalist practice skills and is considered the first professional social work degree. BSSW graduates are eligible for membership in the principal professional organization, the National Association of Social Workers. In addition to preparing students for generalist social work practice, the BSSW program is designed to provide an excellent foundation for those who wish to pursue graduate education in social work or in other graduate programs.

The BSSW program is accredited by the Council on Social Work Education (CSWE). CSWE accreditation is important for at least three reasons. First, it promotes a high quality, comprehensive social work education. Second, some states, including Missouri, offer professional licensure to graduates of CSWE-accredited undergraduate programs. Third, many Master of Social Work (MSW) programs grant advanced standing (i.e. waiver of introductory social work courses) to graduates of CSWE-accredited undergraduate social work programs. For example, the Saint Louis University MSW program gives advanced

standing credit for up to 18 credit hours with a test out option for Research Methods 1 in Social Work, resulting in students taking 39-41 credit hours rather than the full 57 credit hours for the MSW degree making it possible to complete both the BSSW and the MSW degrees in five years.

Evening BSSW Program

In addition to having a program for traditional day students, the School of Social Work provides an opportunity for working adults to earn a social work degree by offering classes during the evening. The Evening Program is offered in a partnership between the School of Social Work and the School for Professional Studies (SPS). Students apply and are admitted to SPS in accordance with their guidelines. Students take core courses (57 credits), elective courses (24 credits) and two social work courses (6 credits) through SPS. After both social work courses and a minimum of 60 hours are completed, students apply to the School of Social Work as a social work major. After being accepted and completing 90 credit hours, the student will transfer to the School of Social Work to complete the junior and senior level social work courses to obtain their BSSW degree.

Admission to the BSSW Program

Incoming freshmen, students changing their majors, and transfer students can identify social work as their intended major. As a professional school, the School of Social Work requires an additional and separate process for formal admission to the social work major. Formal admission to the social work major typically occurs at the end of the sophomore year.

Accelerated Program (BSSW and MSW in 5 Years)

BSSW students interested in pursuing their MSW degree at Saint Louis University have the opportunity to complete their BSSW and MSW degrees in five years. Students select a concentration in the MSW program in the Spring semester of their junior year in one of four areas: Health and Mental Health; Family; Community and Organizations; and Applied Behavior Analysis. BSSW students who receive a grade of "B" or better in their undergraduate social work courses receive 18 credit hours of graduate credit ("advanced standing") for those courses. Additionally, with careful planning, students can take up to 9 graduate credit hours (3 courses) during their senior year. Students then graduate with a total of 27 credit hours toward their MSW degree. Students would then need to successfully complete only 30 credit hours to earn their MSW. Students could begin taking courses either during the summer or fall following their May graduation. All courses could be complete within three semesters (Summer, Fall, and Spring; or Fall, Spring, and Summer) although, longer completion times are possible. Students considering this option need to carefully plan their schedules with their social work faculty mentor or academic advisor to accomplish this.

Accelerated Program (BSSW and Master of Science in Applied Behavior Analysis (ABA) in 5 years)

BSSW students interested in Applied Behavior Analysis have the opportunity to complete their BSSW and Master of Science in Applied Behavior Analysis in five years. BSSW students must have a 3.0 cumulative GPA by the end of the first semester junior year and maintained through BSSW graduation to be eligible to participate. Students should take two specific electives (6 credit hours) during their senior year. During their Master year, students will take six ABA courses (18 credit hours), three ABA practica with Integrative Seminars (9 credit hours), and complete a thesis (6 credit hours). All courses could be completed within three semesters (Fall, Spring, and Summer), although longer completion times are possible. Students considering this option need to carefully plan their schedules with their social work faculty mentor or academic advisor to accomplish this program of study.
